 Subject: **One Foot Step Sequence**

Questions (clarifications)	Answers	Comments
<p>For the following scenarios, how would the Technical Panel evaluate the One Foot Step Sequence turns when determining the level for each partner?</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Choreographed correctly - One Foot Step Sequence Turns are performed simultaneously. 2. Choreographed correctly but there is a fall, interruption or touch down by one partner. 3. Choreographed correctly but there is a small loss of control by one partner. As a result, some of the turns are not performed exactly at the same time. 4. Choreographed incorrectly - The turns are choreographed with one partner executing a Twizzle while the other partner performs a long change of edge. 	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. The first attempt of One Foot Step Sequence Turns are considered for both partners for Level. 2. For this scenario, the Level for the partner who did an error is based on the One Foot Turns executed prior to the fall, interruption or touch down. The Level for the other partner is evaluated separately. 3. For this scenario, the Technical Panel consider the first attempt of One Foot Step Sequence Turns for both partners for Level. 4. For this scenario, ONLY the One Foot Turns performed simultaneously are considered for the Level. The Twizzle would be ignored by the Technical Panel. 	<p>The Technical Panel will only consider the One Foot Step Sequence Turns for the level when performed simultaneously. Turns do not have to be the same but must be performed at the same time. Any attempt of a One Foot Step Sequence Turn done only by one partner at a time is ignored by the Technical Panel EXCEPT when there is a fall, interruption or touch down. Errors resulting in a lower Level are evaluated per partner (in the same way as Sequential and Synchronized Twizzles).</p> <p>If one partner has a fall, interruption or touch down, from that point the requirement to perform the Turns at the same time by both partners can no longer be fulfilled. The mistake is taken into consideration only to the partner who made the error. The other partner's Turns can be still considered for their level even though these turns are not performed simultaneously (Comm. 2188, paragraph 1.6.1. subparagraph 5. and 6.).</p> <p>For the Judges, all four scenarios would be evaluated with the GOE Marking Guide.</p>
